Harvest Collection



Thank you to everyone who donated as part of the Harvest collection. Whilst we weren't able to sell produce as normal in the sanctuary this year, a total of £325 was raised. Lodging House Mission is a charity which we have supported a number of times in the past and dedicates its work to providing care and support to homeless, vulnerable and socially excluded people in Glasgow. During October, seven boxes and one bag of groceries were collected in the donation boxes in church and passed on to LHM.

National Giving Day—31st October

The Church of Scotland this year encouraged all congregations to have a National Giving Day in the hope that this provided people of all ages an opportunity to reflect on God's presence with us through these challenging times and to offer gifts of thanksgiving back to God.



Money received through this initiative will remain with participating congregations who will choose how to use these gifts. We would like to thank everyone who contributed to this initiative. A total of £4,253.70 has been raised by the congregation. The Kirk Session will decide how best to spend the money and look forward to sharing this with the congregation in due course.

Eastwood Knitters



Sunday School Update





Finding Hope in the Long Term

There is a strength to Advent that is necessary to counter the path of the world at the moment. People of faith, and that includes all faiths, spiritual and otherwise, need seasons such as this to move the world from focussing on existential crises to living in hope. It is easy to see signs of disaster, but can we see signs of hope?

Both Jeremiah and Luke want us to face that positive direction, and as we enter Advent, we are more ready to hear words of hope, but more than just hearing then, both passages invite us to ground them in our behaviour and relationships with the world and with each other.

Yet, the first hearers of Jesus words, could not have come away feeling positive. Surely they would have felt overwhelmed, exhausted, even terrified. Many have felt these emotions strongly over the last two years. But how do we now turn to seek hope as we move through the effects of the pandemic, withdrawing from Afghanistan, and Climate Crisis now COP26 is over?

Recently, we have been trained to look for immediate hope. There is an urgency about the climate which has to be responded to within half a generation and we seek good news now about green technology, CO2 reduction, new planting schemes and other local ventures: immediate hope. We look towards the economic figures, almost weekly, to seek hope that a global economy is sustainably growing after the pandemic: immediate hope. Governments see only a single term of office.

The tradition of the 'second coming' in this season is not about an imminent return, though Jesus does suggest within a generation he would return, but that has not been the case. People of faith are tenacious visionaries, and we have learned to speak about hope in the long-term. It is a skill to be able to see beyond the next week, the next cycle, the next government, the next generation (as both Abraham and Moses found!). It is why we are still here after

many thousands of years: hope is in the long-term.

Seeking signs of hope, Jesus turns us towards creation: the seasons and cycles. There is a pattern there, a long-term pattern. We live within that pattern, that seasonal approach that reminds us of the return of hope.

Faithful thinking, visionary thinking, long-term hope is vital for our faith for it prevents us falling into such cynicism. Hope inspires our imagination. It gives energy to possibilities and alternative outcomes.

Jeremiah speaks of this hope-filled imagination: not something the Almighty imposes on us without us being involved. Quite the opposite. Such hope is found in what God does through us and within us; what God will do in relationship with us and the world.

Advent is the invitation to reimagine the world as just, as righteous, as forgiven, as renewed. These are gifts for the world which faith brings in this season. The signs of disaster are everyday almost. We feel low and tired, Jesus words feel very real and 'today'.

Where, as people of faith, shall we look for signs of hope?

We are not called to speculate about that future, but to live in relationship with it. There lies hope: our choice to be part of the future, reimagined, as God reimagined everything through incarnation.
