General Assembly 2022

As in 2016, I had the pleasure of attending this year's General Assembly as Eastwood's nominated commissioner. Also, as in 2016, I found it a very rewarding and humbling experience and would absolutely recommend it to anyone who has the chance to attend in future. It was, of course, made easier for many of us this year as we were able to attend remotely on Zoom and, while the remote attendees inevitably missed out on the fellowship and fringe events that being in Edinburgh would have provided, I was very happy to take advantage of the ability to attend from home. About a third of commissioners attended remotely and it worked very well.

I think I have a reasonable understanding of the work of The Church of Scotland, but reading through the reports and listening to the debates it was hard not to be overwhelmed by the sheer volume and scope of all the work that is done, not just in Scotland but all around the world. Yes – it can sometimes be difficult to see 'church' other than in our own little local setting – and we sometimes regard the church hierarchy as an obstacle to our local work - but that is the whole point of the Presbyterian structure; there is no hierarchy, there is no 'them' and 'us'. We all – as members of The Church of Scotland – have the same say as anyone else. Being able to attend meetings of all the courts of the church, be that Kirk Session, Presbytery, various Committees or Councils or the General Assembly itself, simply exemplifies that. This structure, where everyone has a say, can, of course, cause some 'operational' difficulties and inevitably leads to delays in major decision making. But perhaps long periods of reflection are not a bad thing?

One thing I take away from this year's Assembly is that we – and I mean all Christians – are all better together than apart. Sure, there are issues / procedures / doctrines / even some beliefs – about which we disagree – but the fundamental truth of the Christian message to love one another is the same for us all. We must concentrate on that rather than those things on which we disagree. Two examples of why this is so important are illustrated by the decisions to allow our ministers to officiate at same sex marriages (if they wish to do so) and the Declaration of Friendship we have made with the Catholic Church in Scotland. It is too easy to concentrate on our differences – let's look at the things that unite us instead. I do hope that those within our church who may disagree with some of the decisions made will think hard about this rather than just fall out with us because of these decisions.

If you haven't already done so, I hope you all acquaint yourselves with at least the main highlights of this year's General Assembly. Luckily for you (and me!) I'm not going to try and produce a summary here but would refer you instead to an excellent (4 page) supplement produced by Life & Work. 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From the Archives

Greater Pollokshaws

Results of Boundary Extensions By Mr Andrew McCallum

The following is an extract from the first instalment of a paper read to the Old Pollokshaws Club by Mr Andrew McCallum, Hon Secretary.

Eastwood, Carnwadric, Kennishead, Cowglen and Nitshill

The subject of this lecture is "Greater Pollokshaws" and by that I mean the area which was added to the ward when the Glasgow municipal boundaries were extended in 1926. That area includes Mansewood, Hillpark, the old Eastwood churchyard, Carnwadric, which in 1926 was no more than a farm, Kennishead, Cowglen and Nitshill. The greater part of the territory outlined is in the parish of Eastwood. The smaller part is in the parish of Paisley; but, as I shall show later, it also should have been in the parish of Eastwood.

Wartime Memories

Quiet Thornliebank was also bombed at the same time as Clydebank as we had a factory at the top of Boydstone Road which made parts for aeroplanes. They missed it but got Eastwood Old Cemetery instead. We went along to Sunday School hopping over the bones which were out on the road. A huge bomb landed on a green patch which was a farm then. They will never build houses there. Further up Thornliebank Road was another factory for planes, hidden down in the trees—they missed that too! Thankfully those times are over.

Eastwood Church was packed every Sunday upstairs and down. We walked from Thornliebank to Eastwood in the blackout every Wednesday night for the Girls' Guildry. My brothers did the same on Friday night for the Boys' Brigade. Then they went to war. Dr. Harper was quiet but a wonderful preacher.
